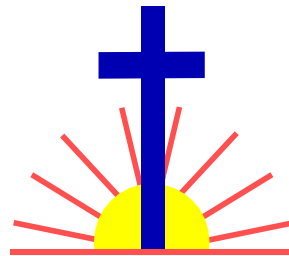


We Are Called

WHAT IS THE CURSILLO MOVEMENT?



The purpose (or goal) of the Movement is to make Christian community possible in neighborhoods, parishes, work situations and other places where people live the greater part of their lives. It makes it possible for anyone in the world to live a Christian life in a natural way.

The Cursillo Movement provides a method and a technique to provide each of us with the tools, the mentality, the strength, and the support to live our lives in a Christ-like manner. It teaches us how to approach evangelization as a very natural act of being Christ like within each of our daily activities.

The Cursillo Movement can assist each of us in developing a deeper understanding of what it means to be fully Catholic by being fully Christian.



THE HISTORY OF THE MOVEMENT -

The Cursillo Movement is a movement of the Catholic Church that began in the 1940s when a group of men dedicated themselves to bringing the young men of their city of Mallorca, Spain, to know Christ better.

The first Cursillo in the United States was held in Waco, Texas in 1957 and was organized on a national basis in 1965.

Today, it is a worldwide movement recognized by the National Conference of Catholic Bishops and is a member of the International Catholic Organizations of the Pontifical Council for the Laity in Rome.

It has been supported directly by Pope Paul VI and John Paul II.

DURING THE CURSILLO WEEKEND
