What Is Stephen Ministry?

Our congregation's Stephen Ministry equips laypeople to provide one-to-one Christian care to people in our congregation and community who are experiencing difficulties in their lives.

Stephen Ministry is a confidential ministry. The identity of those receiving care and everything they discuss with a Stephen Minister remain private.

A Stephen Minister Is . . .

- A child of God who walks beside someone who is hurting.
- A congregation member who is carefully selected to serve in this role because of his or her caregiving gifts.
- A layperson with 50 hours of training in providing high-quality, distinctively Christian care.
- A caring Christian friend who listens, cares, prays, supports, and encourages.
- Someone who meets faithfully each week with his or her care receiver for as long as there's a need.



What is Stephen Ministry?

- Stephen Ministry is a distinctively Christian confidential caregiving available to people going through difficult times and who are in need of support in their lives.
- It is a Christ-centered ministry, where God is the "curegiver" and Stephen Ministers are "caregivers".
- Stephen Ministers are lay members of a parish who have gone through 50 hours of training to provide confidential Christian care to individuals experiencing a crisis or challenge in life.
- They provide one on one <u>confidential</u> care to members of the church and the community.
- Stephen Ministers are each assigned a care receiver and meet with that care receiver for about an hour a week. This caring relationship will last for as long as the care receiver needs it.
- Stephen Ministers also participate in twice monthly small group peer supervision to provide the best care.

Why Lay Ministry?

Stephen Ministry is based on the idea that all Christians are called to minister to others.

The responsibility for passing on God's love is for all Christians, not just for a chosen few.

God has given us all gifts for ministry and called us to put those gifts to use.

Stephen Ministry is a way for people with special gifts for caring to use those gifts to bring Christ's love to people in need.

Who benefits from Stephen Ministry?

- <u>Those receiving care</u> from Stephen Ministers benefit because they receive prayer and support throughout the crisis they face.
- <u>Stephen Ministers</u> benefit through the training and the spiritual growth they experience from being involved in a meaningful ministry.
- <u>Priests</u> benefit because the caring ministry at the parish is expanded, and fewer people will slip through the cracks.
- Most of all you benefit from the knowledge that special care is available to you should you need it. In addition, you now have a place where you can refer a friend, neighbor, coworker, relative, or anyone else you know who is going through a difficult time so that they can receive special care when they need it most. Stephen Ministry makes our parishes a much more caring place!



How does Stephen Ministry work?

- When someone requests a Stephen Minister, the Stephen Ministry Coordinator/ Leader of the parish will meet with that person.
- The Leader will explain what Stephen Ministry is, and help determine whether Stephen Ministry is the kind of care that person needs.
- The leader then matches that person with one of the available Stephen Ministers.
- The Stephen Minister will then call that person to begin meeting with him or her for about an hour each week as long as there is a need. Everything a care receiver says to his or her Stephen Minister is kept confidential.
- The Stephen Minister doesn't try to solve problems; rather, he or she listens, cares, prays, and helps the care receiver find his or her path to healing and wholeness.
- The Stephen Ministers receive continuing education and twice monthly peer group supervision so that they are equipped to provide the best care.
